BA COMMUNITY STUDIES (COMMUNITY WORK SPECIALISM) (L581)
[Last intake of students October 2001]

Programme offered at: Durham.

Mode of study: this programme is available part-time.

1. Applicants for the CertHE/DipHE/BA in Community Studies (Community Work Specialism):
 - (a) Must have relevant experience in community work or a related field prior to admission.
 - (b) Will be required to demonstrate that they are adequately prepared to study for the award of the degree, diploma or certificate.
 - I Will be required to complete a declaration as to previous or pending prosecutions since they are potentially having unsupervised, substantial access to children and young people. This requirement does not abridge the protection provided by the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act (1974) and a previous conviction would not automatically affect admission to the programme.
 - (d) Must supply appropriate academic/professional references.
2. The decision whether a student may be admitted shall rest with the Chairman or Chairwoman of the Board of Studies in Applied Social Sciences.
3. Students who are not eligible under the core regulations for undergraduate programmes for progression to Honours Level 2 in Community Studies (Community Work Specialism) but who are eligible for progression to the Ordinary degree will transfer to the Ordinary degree in Community Studies, which does not carry professional endorsement.
4. The Dip HE in Community Studies (Community Work Specialism) is awarded on the basis of work undertaken at Levels 1 and 2. In order to qualify for this award students must pass all Level 1 modules at 40%. At Level 2 students must, in addition to meeting the requirements of the core regulations for undergraduate programmes for the award of a Dip HE, pass Fieldwork Practice at 40% or above, and must also pass at 40% or above three of the four University-based modules, obtain a mark of at least 35% in the fourth under an exemption from the Core Regulations, and obtain an overall average mark of 40% in the Level 2 assessments. Students who fail to meet these requirements may not be awarded the Dip HE in Community Studies (Community Work Specialism), or to proceed to study for the BA in Community Studies (Community Work Specialism).
5. Students registered for the Dip HE in Community Studies (Community Work Specialism) who fail to meet the requirements detailed above but who nevertheless satisfy the core regulations for undergraduate programmes in respect of the award of a Dip HE shall be entitled to the award of the Dip HE in Community Studies, and/or to proceed to study for the BA in Community Studies.
6. All module choices are subject to approval by the Course Leader.
