2. Mode of study: full-time (12 months), part-time (24 months)
3. Programme of study:
  - (a) all candidates must take, to a value of no more than 100 credits:

    - (ii) modules to the value of at least 20 and no more than 40 credits from Sections B, C, or D
    - (iii) modules to the value of at least 20 and no more than 50 credits from Sections C - I
  - (b) candidates for the MA in Classics must also take:

    - (ii) further modules to the value of no more than 30 credits from Sections C – I
  - (c) candidates for the MA in Ancient Epic must take:

  - (d) candidates for the MA in Ancient Historiography must take:
    - (i) Dissertation (Ancient Historiography) ([CLAS40360](#))

# Candidates taking this option may take no more than 40 credits of modules at Levels 1-3 in total and will be required to complete more than 180 credits for the award of MA.

4. Modes of assessment will include long essays, test papers, written examination and a dissertation.
5. Candidates in their final year must submit, by no later than 11 September 2009, a dissertation ([CLAS51260](#) / [CLAS40160](#) / [CLAS40360](#) / [CLAS40460](#) / [CLAS40260](#)) of not more than 15,000 words (including footnotes and appendices, but excluding the bibliography).
6. If a candidate fails a module and does not wish to wait for the time of the next normal assessment for that module, he/she will be given an opportunity to resit the relevant examination(s) or resubmit the relevant work before the end the academic year in which it was originally required, at a time to be determined by the department.

Note: not all modules will be available every year.
