Programmes offered at: Durham.

Mode of study: these programmes are available full-time and part-time.

1. All module selections must be approved by the Director of the Combined Honours programmes or his or her nominee.
2. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the Ordinary degree at the next level in that subject.
3. At Level 1:
  - All students registered for BA Combined Honours in Arts must take ‘Sound, Text and Image’, [EDUC1011](#);
  - All students registered for BA Combined Honours in Social Sciences must take ‘The Discipline of Social Science’, [EDUC1191](#).
4. In addition to their core module, at Level 1 all students take modules to the value of 100 credits from at least two and no more than four subjects chosen from the list of Level 1 modules given below. No more than 60 credits may be chosen from any one subject. A student may take up to 40 credits from outside the list of modules that make up the Combined Honours programme.
5. At Level 2 students take modules from at least two and no more than four subjects, to a maximum of 80 credits per subject. Students may be permitted to study, at Level 2, modules to the value of 40 credits from the list of Level 1 modules given below.
6. At Level 3 students take modules from at least two and no more than three subjects to a maximum of 80 credits per subject. Students may be permitted to study, at Level 3, Level 2 modules to the value of 40 credits from the list of Final Honours modules given below.
7. A student may take up to 120 credits from outside the list of modules that make up the Combined Honours programme over Levels 1, 2 and 3.
8. A student may not select modules solely from a single Board of Studies.
9. Within the Combined Honours programme, certain combinations of modules are known as Named Routes. Students who follow these combinations of modules will be awarded a subject-specific title for their degree.
10. Students who follow an approved two-subject Named Route combination, known as a Joint Honours degree, will be awarded either a BA in A and B or a BA in A with B, where A and B are replaced by the approved subject titles. Normally each subject will have a single subject title.
11. In order to qualify for the degree BA in A and B, students must select modules from the same two subjects at Levels 2 and 3 from the list of approved modules for that route. The number of credits in each subject must be no more than 140 and no less than 100 over Levels 2 and 3 together. The availability of subject combinations will be determined by the timetable.

The following combinations are currently available:

- Music and Modern Languages
12. Students who follow an approved interdisciplinary Named Route will be awarded a BA in this named route. In order to qualify for this degree, students must select an appropriate combination of modules chosen from the list of approved modules for that route, and in accordance with the prerequisites for progression within that route. The following interdisciplinary Named Routes are available:

- BA European Studies within the Combined Honours Programme
13. Where students who have not taken a BA Named Route have taken modules offered by departments in both the Faculty of Arts and Humanities and the Faculty of Social Sciences and Health, they shall be awarded BA Combined Honours in Arts or BA Combined Honours in Social Sciences dependent upon the balance of credits taken from departments in the two faculties during Levels 2 and 3. In cases where the balance of credits is equal between the two faculties, the student shall be awarded BA Combined Honours in Arts or BA Combined Honours in Social Sciences dependent upon the core module taken at Level 1.
  14. The degree certificate issued to successful students who have not taken a BA Named Route degree shall list all subjects in which they have taken at least 40 credits during Levels 2 and 3 together of the degree programme.

### **Modules available within the Combined Honours Programmes**

The modules that form the Combined Honours programmes are listed below. All selected modules must be timetable compatible.

Students studying within a Combined Honours programme will often progress from one level to the next in a particular subject, whether they are studying for a Combined Honours degree or a Joint Honours degree. Within a particular subject there are often modules that must be passed to allow this progression. In the tables that follow the lists below, these required modules are marked.

For students following a Joint Honours degree, specific modules are often required at each Level and these are listed in the tables below. For students not following a Joint Honours degree, there is often a free choice of Level 3 modules in the final level, unless the tables below specify particular modules.

### **Year Abroad**

Full time students on Combined Honours in Arts and Combined Honours in Social Sciences who intend to take Level 3 modules offered by the School of Modern Languages and Cultures are required to insert, as an integral part of their programme between Levels 2 and 3, an academic year spent in a suitable country or countries, in circumstances acceptable to the Director of Combined Honours in consultation with the Departments concerned. Part time students on Combined Honours in Arts and Combined Honours in Social Sciences who intend to take Level 3 modules offered by the School of Modern Languages and Cultures may undertake such a year between Levels 2 and 3.

Students who undertake a year abroad between Levels 2 and 3 will complete a series of projects for each of the languages they intend to study at Level 3. The projects are assessed as part of the Level 3 compulsory module in the appropriate language, and an oral examination will also be applied for each language studied at Level 3 on their return into residence.<sup>∞</sup>

Notes:

For the purpose of degree classification, where a candidate continues study of a language at Level 3, 50% of the marks for the Level 3 Core Language Module in that language will be derived from the projects and oral examination.

<sup>∞</sup> If, for any reason, a student is permitted not to spend this year abroad, no projects or oral examination will be required for any languages studied at Level 3.

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*[For students entering from October 2008]*

Programmes offered at: Durham.

Mode of study: these programmes are available full-time and part-time.

1. All module selections must be approved by the Director of Combined Honours or his or her nominee.

2. All selected modules must be timetable compatible.
3. Students may take up to 180 credits from outside the list of modules that make up their Combined Honours programme over Levels 1, 2 and 3.
4. Students may not select modules solely from a single Board of Studies.
5. At Level 1:
  - All students registered for BA Combined Honours in Arts must take 'The Humanities in the Modern World', [COMB1011](#);
  - All students registered for BA Combined Honours in Social Sciences must take 'The Discipline of Social Science', [COMB1021](#).
6. In addition to their core module, at Level 1 all students take modules to the value of 100 credits from at least two and no more than four subjects. No more than 60 credits may be chosen from any one subject. Students may take up to 60 credits from outside the list of modules that make up their Combined Honours programme.
7. At Level 2 students take modules from at least two and no more than four subjects, to a maximum of 80 credits per subject and they may be permitted to study Level 1 modules to the value of 40 credits.
8. At Level 3 students take modules from at least two and no more than three subjects to a maximum of 80 credits per subject, and they may be permitted to study Level 2 modules to the value of 40 credits.
9. At Level 3 all students are required to undertake a dissertation, or equivalent project-based module approved by the Director of Combined Honours or his or her nominee.
10. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level in that subject.

#### **Year Abroad**

11. Full time students who intend to take Level 3 modules offered by the School of Modern Languages and Cultures are required to insert, as an integral part of their programme between Levels 2 and 3, an academic year spent in a suitable country or countries, in circumstances acceptable to the Director of Combined Honours in consultation with the Departments concerned. Part time students who intend to take Level 3 modules offered by the School of Modern Languages and Cultures must spend at least 8 weeks in a country whose language they wish to study at Level 3. These 8 weeks may be spread over the duration of the programme.
12. Students who undertake a year abroad between Levels 2 and 3 will complete a series of projects for each of the languages they intend to study at Level 3. The projects are assessed as part of the Level 3 compulsory module in the appropriate language, and an oral examination will also be applied for each language studied at Level 3 on their return into residence.<sup>∞</sup>

#### Notes:

For the purpose of degree classification, where a candidate continues study of a language at Level 3, 50% of the marks for the Level 3 Core Language Module in that language will be derived from the projects and oral examination.

<sup>∞</sup> If, for any reason, a student is permitted not to spend this year abroad, no projects or oral examination will be required for any languages studied at Level 3.

#### **Degree title**

13. Where students have taken modules listed for both Combined Honours in Arts and Combined Honours in Social Sciences, they shall be awarded BA Combined Honours in Arts or BA Combined Honours in Social Sciences dependent upon the balance of credits taken from the two programmes during Levels 2 and 3. In cases where the balance of credits is equal, the degree title shall be dependent upon the core module taken at Level 1.
14. The degree certificate issued to successful students shall list all subjects in which they have taken at least 40 credits over Levels 2 and 3.

### European Studies – Requirements for Progression

In the following list, it is assumed that modules can be taken only if the appropriate prerequisites, corequisites and excluded combinations have been satisfied. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the Ordinary degree at the next level in that subject.

- Level 1** In addition to taking the Level 1 core, integrative module for their programme, students must also take one 20 credit core language module (marked ¥) and one other 20 credit module in one of French, German, Spanish, Italian or Russian selected from Groups 1 – 5 of the modules listed as available to students following the European Studies named route. Students must also take 60 credits selected from at least two of the Groups 6 – 9 of the modules listed as available to students following the European Studies named route.
- Level 2** Students must take the 20 credit core language module in the language studied at Level 1 and one further 20 credit module in the language studied at Level 1, selected from Groups 1 – 5 of the list of modules available to students following the European Studies named route. Students must also take 80 credits, selected from at least two of Groups 1 – 9 of the modules listed as available to students following the European Studies named route.
- Year 3 (Year abroad)** Students are required to spend their third year abroad, in a country where a language they will study at Level 3 is spoken.
- Level 3** Students must take the 20 credit core language module in the language studied at Levels 1 and 2 and one further 20 credit module in the language studied at Levels 1 and 2, selected from Groups 1 – 5 of the list of modules available to students following the European Studies named route. Students must also take:  
EITHER a 20 credit dissertation module from those listed in Groups 6 – 9, and modules to the value of 60 credits selected from at least two of Groups 1 – 9 of the modules listed as available to students following the European Studies named route.



OR a 40 credit dissertation module from those listed in Groups 6 – 9, and modules to the value of 40 credits selected from at least two of Groups 1 – 9 of the modules listed as available to students following the European Studies named route.
