

CERTIFICATE IN LEGAL STUDIES (M3C1)

1. Candidates for the Certificate in Legal Studies should satisfy the University Matriculation requirements and the entry requirements of the Department. They may be students at another approved University or they may be graduates of this or another approved university, except that they may not be graduates in Law (or with a degree in which Law was a substantial component) from a United Kingdom university.
2. Candidates who are not students at another university or graduates may be admitted with the approval of the Chair of the Board of Studies in Law on such conditions as he/she deems appropriate. Such Candidates may be required to submit written work in support of their applications.
3. All candidates must satisfy the Chair of the Board of Studies that their proficiency in the English Language is adequate to the course.
4. The Certificate is a one-year, full-time course and students who are not matriculated will be required to be so.
5. All students are required to fulfil their academic commitments as provided in paragraph 1 of Section V of the University General Regulations. Failure so to do will render a student liable to be required to withdraw from the University under the provisions of that section.
6. Candidates will be required to satisfy the examiners in undergraduate modules to the value of 120 credits. A student who fails one or more modules may resit the examination on one more occasion only.
7. Candidates may choose their subjects from the list of undergraduate modules offered by the Board of Studies in Law in the particular year (please refer to the LLB in Law entry). Candidates' choices are subject to consultation with and approval of the Chair of the Board of Studies.
8. Examinations will be held in May/June. Resit examinations will be held in August/September.
9. The Chair of the Board of Studies may delegate functions under these regulations to a Director of Legal Studies to be appointed by the Board of Studies from among its members.
10. A candidate registered for the Certificate in Legal Studies has the right to appeal against academic decisions relating to his/her candidature in accordance with the Academic Appeals Regulations contained in Section VII of the General Regulations printed in the University Calendar.
