

MODERN LANGUAGES AND CULTURES

BA MODERN LANGUAGES (R000)

Programme offered at: Durham.

Mode of study: this programme is available full-time and part-time.

The major languages offered for the degree are Arabic (beginners only), French, German, Italian, Russian and Spanish. Minor languages offered are Catalan (modules in which count as Spanish modules), and Croatian with Serbian (modules in which count as Russian modules). In the entry that follows, 'subject' refers to Arabic, French, German, Italian, Russian and Spanish (unless otherwise stated).

The degree programme consists of 120 credits at each Level, chosen from one, two or three subjects. The modules in Modern Languages are of two types: Core Language Modules (marked ¥ below), and Modern Language Options (ML Options). Core Language Modules are compulsory in every subject studied and some other modules may be compulsory. ML Options are subject to availability. Catalan may be taken as an ML Option by students not studying Spanish.

No full-time student may study more than three languages (whether major or minor) at any one time;

Part-time students may study up to but not more than two languages;

Part-time student studying over six years must study at least one core language module in years 1, 3 and 5 of their period of study; Part-time students studying over nine years must study at least one core language module in years 1, 4 and 7 of their period of study;

Part-time students may study modules outside the School of Modern Languages and Cultures at Levels 1 and 2 if they are studying only one language.

Full-time students spend the third year of their programme abroad, with a minimum of four weeks in each country whose language they wish to study at Level 3;

Part-time students must spend at least 8 weeks in a country whose language they wish to study at Level 3. These 8 weeks may be spread over the duration of the programme.

Full-time and part-time students will complete a project, relating to the year abroad, for each of the major languages they intend to study at Level 3, and an oral examination will be applied on their return into residence. The project/oral is assessed as part of the Level 3 compulsory module in the appropriate language but passing the assessment is not a prerequisite for progression to Level 3.

For candidates with A-level (or equivalent), modules are available in French, German, Russian, or Spanish at all Levels of the degree; also Italian from entry in 2007.

For candidates who wish to take *ab initio* Language Modules:

[With effect from October 2009]

Ab initio Arabic is available as a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at Level 1 and a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at Level 2, with up to 120 credits available at Level 3;

Ab initio Russian is available as a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at Level 1 and as a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at Level 2, with up to 120 credits available at Level 3;

Ab initio Spanish is available as a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at Level 1 and as a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at level 2, with up to 120 credits available at Level 3;

Ab initio Italian is available as a 40, 60 or 80 credit subject at Level 1 and at 40, 60 or 80 credits at Level 2, with up to 120 credits available at Level 3.

No more than two of the above languages may be taken *ab initio* at Level 1 and 2, and only one language may be commenced *ab initio* in any Level. No candidate may begin the study of any *ab initio* languages at Level 3.

No candidate may normally be permitted to begin the study of a post A-level language at Level 2 without Head of School approval.

No more than one dissertation module may be taken.

Students may select modules in accordance with the following scheme:

LEVEL 1 (Certificate)

EITHER (i) One subject of 80 credits and one subject of 40 credits from within the School

OR (ii) One subject of 80 credits from within the School and 40 credits chosen from those offered

- by other Boards of Studies outside the School
- OR (iii) Two subjects of 60 credits each from within the School
- OR (iv) Three subjects of 40 credits each from within the School

LEVEL 2 (Diploma)

As Level 1 (but not necessarily following the same pattern as was selected in Level 1). All modules studied and examined in the second year must be passed before students are permitted to embark on their year abroad.

YEAR 3 (Year Abroad for full-time students)

To be spent abroad in a country or countries where a language (or languages) which the candidate intends to study at Level 3 is spoken. For each language to be studied at Level 3, it is a requirement to spend a period of residence in a country where the language is spoken. During the course of this year, students will complete a series of projects, related to residence abroad, for each of the languages they intend to study at Level 3. The projects are assessed as part of the Level 3 compulsory module in the appropriate language, and an oral examination will also be applied for each language studied at Level 3 on their return into residence. ∞

LEVEL 3 (Degree)

- EITHER(i) One subject of 120 credits, including the Compulsory Core Language ModuleOR(ii) One subject of 100 credits, including the Compulsory Core Language Module, and one 20
- credit ML Option from a language studied at Level 2 (subject to the approval of the Chair of the Board of Studies in Modern Languages)
- OR (iii) One subject of 80 credits and one subject of 40 credits, both from within the School. The Core Language Module must be taken in both subjects
- OR (iv) Two subjects of 60 credits each from within the School, including the Core Language Module in both subjects. With the approval of the Chair of the Board of Studies, candidates may substitute for one of their 20 credit modules an ML Option whose corresponding Core Language Module they have passed at Level 2
- OR (v) Three subjects of 40 credits each from within the School, including the Core Language Module in each subject

Notes:

For the purpose of degree classification, where a candidate continues study of a language at Level 3, 25% of the marks for the Level 3 Core Language Module in that language will be derived from the projects and oral examination, except in Arabic where 20% of the marks for the Level 3 Core Language module will be derived from the projects and oral examination. Students *beginning* a new language at Level 2 will take Level 1 examinations at the end of Level 2.

 ∞ If, for any reason, a student is permitted not to spend this year abroad, no projects or oral examination will be required for any languages studied at Level 3.
