# Postgraduate Certificate Education (International) – Secondary (X7K414)

1. Location: Durham City

2. Mode of study: full-time (12 months)

#### Admissions

3. Candidates must have attained in Mathematics and in English Language, the standard required to achieve a grade C in the GCSE examination (or equivalent); and satisfy the Chair of the Board of Studies in Education that they are suitable candidates to undertake an academic programme with a professional competence aspect to it.

4. Candidates shall study and be assessed in the following modules:

School-Based Education (Int) Self Directed Study – Subject Specific Issues in School-Based	EDUC43430	30
Education (Int) Professional Issues in School-based Education (Int)	EDUC30230	30

### **Assessment**

- 5. Modes of assessment will include assignments and a professional portfolio.
- 6. Students during the Postgraduate Certificate year who achieve a mark of less than 50% in any taught module at the first attempt will resubmit at the next occasion as stated on a date stipulated in the course handbook.
- 7. A candidate whose performance in school practice or aspects of whose general conduct are judged by the Chair or the Board of Studies in Education, after consultation with the Course Director, appropriate members of the School of Education and any relevant teachers and head teachers, to be indicative of unsuitability for the professional standards required of the programme, shall be regarded as having failed to fulfil their academic commitments and may ultimately be required by the chair of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Health Learning and Teaching Committee (Postgraduate), on the recommendation of the Chair of the Board of Studies in Education, to withdraw from the programme.
