Modules marked with a ¥ require students to attend three weeks at an excavation specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology which forms a compulsory component of the Level 2 modules Professional Training (ARCH2102). This will normally take place during the Long Vacation preceding entry to Final Honours. In addition, students shall be required to attend a further three weeks of fieldwork as approved by the Board of Studies in Archaeology.
- 12. Modules marked with a Ω cannot be taken in conjunction with each other.
- 13. Only one 20 credit module marked with a \pm can be taken at Levels 2 and 3 combined.
- 14. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 39% cannot be compensated.
