Assessment, progression and award

10. Modules marked with # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.
11. Modules marked with a ¥ require students to attend three weeks on a placement specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology. For the Level 2 module Professional Training this will normally be an excavation placement during the summer preceding entry to Level 2. For the Level 3 module Advanced Professional Training this will normally take place during the summer preceding entry to Level 3
12. Only 20 credits marked with a ± can be taken at Levels 2 and 3 combined.
13. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
