18. Placement study in this framework will be assessed at threshold level; the student will be assessed by the host university in the way that is normal for their own students.
19. The Board of Examiners may consider the marks reported by the host university when, at the end of the subsequent year, it is determining the degree classification of borderline cases.
20. Students who receive a fail mark for the year abroad will not be allowed to proceed to the final year of BA Classics (European Studies) but instead must proceed to the final year of BA Classics.
