At levels 2 and 3, taken together, candidates must take both Economic Principles I: Macroeconomics ([ECON2011](#)) AND Economic Principles II: Microeconomics ([ECON2021](#)).

A Dissertation must be taken alongside at least one other module in the relevant discipline.

At Level 3 candidates must study modules from at least two disciplines.

At either of Levels 2 and 3, candidates may, with the permission of the Director of Studies, take a module offered by another Board of Studies in an area closely related to Philosophy, Politics or Economics.
