Year 3 (Year Abroad)

9. Candidates who have successfully completed 240 credits at Levels 1 and 2 progress to Year 3 (Year Abroad). Such students will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas University (the host institution), taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology with Year Abroad. Students who are considered by the Board of Examiners in Anthropology to have achieved successful completion (judged by reference to each student's learning agreement), will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (L602).
