Year Abroad

9. During the third year of study students are required, as an integral part of their degree programme, to pursue and be assessed in a programme of study at one of the universities participating in the Year Abroad programme with the Schools of Applied Social Sciences and Anthropology. They must have successfully completed 240 credits at Levels 1 and 2 to progress to the placement, during which they will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology and Sociology with Year Abroad.

Level 3 (Degree)

10. Candidates shall study and be assessed in modules to the value of 40 credits from the list below::

- 11. Candidates shall study and be assessed in modules to the value of 40 credits chosen from the list of Level 3 modules in the entry for BA Sociology.
- 12. Candidates shall also study and be assessed in modules to the value of 40 credits chosen from List D in the entry for BA Anthropology.

Assessment, progression and award

- 13. Modules marked with a # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.
- 14. 10 credit modules can only be taken with a corresponding 10 credit module in the subsequent term.



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- 15. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 39% cannot be compensated.
- 16. At least one module marked with a ≠ must be taken at Level 2 in order to fulfil the prerequisites for the dissertation modules SOCI3192 or ANTH3382.
- 17. Only one modern foreign language module marked § may be taken at Level 1 and only one such module at Levels 2 and 3 combined.
