Students may only take the 20 credit dissertation module by special permission of the programme director for V100. This will be granted in cases where a student lacks the necessary language skills or access to primary sources in their chosen field of study.
17. Modules to the value of at least 40 credits and no more than 80 credits must be taken in each subject area at Level 3 (i.e. in each of Ancient History [modules classed CLAS\*\*\*\*] and Medieval/Modern History [modules classed HIST\*\*\*\*]).
18. Modules marked Δ indicate that students taking 60 or more credits in History at Level 3 must include within that a 60 credit Special Subject or a Dissertation in History.
19. Modules marked Ω will be taught and assessed in Michaelmas Term only.
20. Modules marked Φ will be taught and assessed in Epiphany and Easter Terms only.
