YEAR 3 (Year abroad)

During the academic year spent abroad, students will be required to follow a course of study in which modules relating to Ancient, Medieval or Modern History comprise a minimum of 50%. Students who are considered by the Board of Examiners to have made satisfactory progress, judges by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the Ancient, Medieval and Modern History (with Year Abroad) (V104) programme. Otherwise, they will transfer to BA (Hons) in Ancient, Medieval and Modern History (V101).

Level 3 (Degree)

11. In accordance with the core regulations, candidates may take no more than 30 credits of Level 2 modules during Level 3. Appropriate credit-bearing language modules from the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study may be taken during Level 3, but only if the combined total of language modules and Level 2 modules taken does not exceed 30 credits.
