MSc Global Politics (L2T109)

1. This programme is available at Durham City in a full-time (12 months) mode of study.

Admissions

2. An Upper Second Class Honours degree, or equivalent, in any related discipline from a recognised university. For applicants whose first language is not English: a minimum score of 7.0 in IELTS (no component less than 6.5) or a minimum score of 102 in TOEFL (no component less than 25). Candidates' wider professional experience will be considered, alongside academic qualifications, during the application process.

Assessment, progression and award

5. Elective modules are subject to availability and timetabling, and to academic adviser approval.

6. Modules marked with a # symbol are subject to the approval of the Board of Studies in Geography.
7. Enrolment in the modules marked with a ¥ symbol is subject to approval.
8. Candidates who have failed modules which are assessed in the January/February and/or May/June assessment period shall normally be required to re-sit all failed modules in the following August assessment period.
9. No more than 75 credits may normally be undertaken in each of Term 1 and Term 2.
10. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 50% or above; a mark of 40-49% cannot be compensated.
11. Total credits may exceed 180 by up to 5 if a 20-credit language module is taken. A language module of more than 20 credits may be taken only with the agreement of the Programme Director, and must be accommodated within the overall 180-credit limit.
