Assessment, progression and award

9. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.
10. Modules marked ¥ require students to attend three weeks on a placement specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology. For the Level 2 module Professional Training this will normally be an excavation placement during the summer preceding entry to Level 2. For the Level 3 module Advanced Professional Training this will normally take place during the summer preceding entry to Level 3.
11. Only 20 credits marked with a ± can be taken at Levels 2 and 3 combined.
12. Modules marked ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
13. Modules marked Ω will be taught and assessed in Michaelmas Term only.
14. Modules marked Φ will be taught and assessed in Epiphany and Easter Terms only.
15. Modules marked with a * are not available in 2015-2016.

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

16. Students admitted to the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (VQ48) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad) programme (V401). Students undertaking the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad) programme (V401) will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad).
17. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad) (V401) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (VQ48) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Archaeology to be admitted to the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad) (V401) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Archaeology; and
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (VQ48) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (VQ48) Honours programme.
18. Students who the Board of Examiners for Archaeology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad) (V401). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (with Year Abroad) (V401), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology and Ancient Civilisations (VQ48) programme.
