- 10. If a candidate fails a module and does not wish to wait for the time of the next normal assessment for that module, he/she may request from the Board of Studies an opportunity to resit the relevant examination(s) or resubmit the relevant work before the end of the academic year.
- 11. Modules marked \* are not available in 2016-17. The availability of all modules may be subject to change.
- 12. Modules marked  $\boldsymbol{\Omega}$  will be taught and assessed in Michaelmas Term only.
- 13. Modules marked  $\Phi$  will be taught and assessed in Epiphany and Easter Terms only.
