BA ENGLISH LITERATURE AND HISTORY WITH YEAR ABROAD (Q2V1)

1. This programme is available at Durham City, in a full-time mode of study. The lead department is English Studies.

Level 1 (Certificate)

2. Candidates will study and be assessed in modules to the value of 60 credits from List A:

Level 2 (Diploma)

- 4. In accordance with the core regulations, candidates may take no more than 30 credits of Level 1 modules during Level 2.

7. Candidates will also study and be assessed in modules to the value of 40 credits from List D:

8. Candidates will also study and be assessed in modules to the value of 40 credits from **Lists B** and **C** in the entry for the <u>BA in English Literature</u> or the Level 2 entry for the <u>BA in History</u>.

Level 3 (Year Abroad)

- 9. Students will undertake an approved placement at a foreign university, taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. Students are particularly encouraged to take literary modules that might be uniquely tied to the regional, national and/or international status of the host institution and/or to take advantage of opportunities to develop/refine foreign language skills if appropriate.
- 10. Students who the English Studies Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA English Literature with History (with Year Abroad) programme (Q2V1). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA English Literature with History (with Year Abroad) (Q2V1) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA English Literature with History (QV21).

Level 3 (Degree)

- 11. In accordance with the core regulations, candidates may take no more than 30 credits of Level 2 modules during Level 3.
- 12. Candidates will study and be assessed in modules to the value of 40 credits from List E:

Assessment, progression and award

- 14. All candidates must submit a dissertation, in either English or History, in Level 3.
- 15. Over Levels 2 and 3, students must choose credits to the value of at least 100, and no more than 140, from those offered by each Board of Studies.
