# BA PHILOSOPHY AND PSYCHOLOGY (CV85) BA PHILOSOPHY AND PSYCHOLOGY (With Year Abroad) (CV58)

1. This programme is available at Durham City, in a full-time mode of study.

### **Admissions**

- 2. This programme is only available to students admitted to the BA Philosophy and Psychology (CV85) programme.
- Candidates wishing to transfer to BA Philosophy and Psychology (with Year Abroad) (CV58) must:
  - a. have successfully completed BA Philosophy and Psychology (CV85) Level 1 and progressed to level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme;
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Philosophy to be admitted to the BA Philosophy and Psychology (with Year Abroad) (CV58) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Philosophy;
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Philosophy and Psychology (CV85) so as to be eligible to progress to level 3 of the BA Philosophy and Psychology (CV85) Honours programme.

## Year 3 (Year Abroad)

- 10. Students will undertake an approved placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. Courses relating to Philosophy or Psychology should normally comprise a minimum of 50% of those taken.
- 11. Students whom the Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy and Psychology (with Year Abroad) (CV58). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Philosophy and Psychology (with Year Abroad) (CV58) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Philosophy and Psychology programme (CV85).

# Assessment, progression and award

- 15. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the Ordinary degree at the next Level.
- 16. Modules marked ~ must be passed at 40% or above. A mark of 30-39% cannot be compensated.
- 17. Modules marked \$ are only available to students who have passed Biology A2 level at Grade B or higher, or an equivalent
- 18. Modules marked \* are not available in 2018/2019

#### **Professional accreditation**

19. This programme is accredited on an ongoing basis from the 2012-13 intake as conferring eligibility for the Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership of the British Psychological Society. Students entering in and after October 2006 need to achieve a minimum of a second class honours degree to gain eligibility.
