Assessment, progression and award

- 9. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 39% cannot be compensated.
- 10. Modules marked ** can only be taken to a total of 40 credits across two or more separate years of the programme.
- 11. Module marked # <u>SGIA2341</u> Research Project must be taken at Level 2 in order to undertake SGIA3142 Dissertation at Level 3.
- 12. Modules marked * are not available in 2018-19.

Year abroad

- 13. Students admitted to the BA International Relations (L250) are able to apply to transfer to the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) programme (L251). Students undertaking the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA International Relations with Year Abroad.
- 14. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) must:
 - have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA International Relations (L250) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs to be admitted to the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs, and;

- c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA International Relations (L250) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (L250) Honours programme.
- 15. Students who the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (L250) programme.
