Assessment, progression and award

10. Progression from Level 1 to Level 2 of the MAnth degree is as described for Honours degrees in the core regulations. Progression between other Levels is also as described in the core regulations.
11. Students who are required to transfer from an MAnth degree to an Ordinary degree at the end of Levels 1 or 2 will be transferred onto the equivalent Bachelors (Ordinary) degree. If students who are required to transfer to an Ordinary degree at the end of Level 1 meet the criteria for transfer back to Honours at the end of Level 2, they shall be permitted to transfer back onto the MAnth programme in Level 3 provided they meet the minimum criteria as specified in the core regulations for progression from Level 2 to Level 3 of an Integrated Masters programme. If students meet the criteria for transfer back to Honours at the end of Level 2 but fail to meet the minimum criteria for progression on the MAnth degree, they shall progress onto the equivalent Bachelors (Honours) degree in Level 3.

12. Students who are required to transfer from an MAnth degree to an Ordinary degree at the end of Level 2 or who remain on the Ordinary degree in Level 3 after transferring at the end of Level 1 will not be permitted to enter Level 4 of the MAnth degree even if they fulfil the criteria for award of Honours at the end of Level 3.
13. A student who is qualified to progress from Level 2 to Level 3 of the MAnth in Medical Anthropology (L605) but wishes to transfer to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) programme shall be permitted to do so;
14. A student who fails to achieve the standard requirement under the Core Regulations for progression to Level 3 of the MAnth in Medical Anthropology (L605) but who achieves the standard required for progression to level 3 of a Bachelors programme may progress to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) in the Honours or Ordinary stream in accordance with the Core Regulations;
15. A student whose achievement at the end of Level 3 does not qualify them to proceed to Level 4 may be awarded the degree of BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) with Honours or Ordinary in accordance with the Core Regulations for the award of a Bachelors degree;
16. A student whose achievement at the end of Level 4 does not qualify them to be awarded the degree of MAnth in Medical Anthropology (L605) may be awarded the degree of BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) with Honours in accordance with the Core Regulations for the award of a Bachelors degree;^^
17. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
18. Modules marked with a # must be at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.
19. Modules marked with a * are not available in 2018-2019.
20. & Only available in 2018-19
21. § [ANTH2031](#) Methods and Analysis will not be available in 2018-19 academic year; Level 2 students out of residence in 2017-18 and returning in 2018-19 must take Doing Anthropological Research [ANTH1101](#) (20 credits, taken at Level 2, permissible under clause 6 of the University's core regulations) in place of [ANTH2031](#) Methods and Analysis.
