Assessment, progression and award

- 8. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 39% cannot be compensated.
- 9. Modules marked with a # must be at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.

A student registered for the BA Anthropology programme who wishes to transfer to the MAnth in Social Anthropology (L606) and is suitably qualified to do so, in accordance with the Core Regulations, shall be permitted to transfer subject to the approval of the Director of Undergraduate Studies;
- 11. [&] Only available in 2018-19.
- 12. ^{\$} <u>ANTH2031</u> Methods and Analysis will not be available from 2018-19 academic year; Level 2 students out of residence in 2017-18 and returning in 2018-19 must take Doing Anthropological Research <u>ANTH1101</u> (20 credits, taken at Level 2, permissible under clause 6 of the University's core regulations) in place of <u>ANTH2031</u> Methods and Analysis.

Year abroad

- 13. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology (L602) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) programme (L609). Students undertaking the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology with Year Abroad.
- 14. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology (L602) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology, and;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology (L602) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (L602) Honours programme.
- 15. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (L602) programme.
