Assessment, progression and award

- 14. Modules marked indicate that students may choose modules from other Boards of Studies to the maximum value of 40 credits across Levels 2 and 3 together.
- 15. Modules marked * are not available in 2018-19.
- 16. Intermediate A and B language modules marked \pm must be taken as A and B together in the same language and at the same level.
- 17. Advanced Latin modules marked † indicate that students may choose a maximum of 40 credits from this group of modules.
- 18. Placement study in this framework will be assessed at threshold level; the student will be assessed by the host university in the way that is normal for their own students.

- 19. The Board of Examiners may consider the marks reported by the host university when, at the end of the subsequent year, it is determining the degree classification of borderline cases.
- 20. Students who receive a fail mark for the year abroad will not be allowed to proceed to the final year of BA Classics (with Year Abroad) but instead must proceed to the final year of BA Classics.

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

- 21. Students admitted to the BA Classics (Q801) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) programme (Q806). Students taking the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) (Q806) will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university following a course of study chosen in consultation with the Level 2 Tutor in the Department of Classics & Ancient History and with the host institution in which modules relating to Classics and Ancient History comprise a minimum of 50%. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) (Q806).
- 22. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) (Q806) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Classics (Q801) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
 - during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Classics & Ancient History to be admitted to the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) (Q806) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure an international placement abroad/year abroad opportunity, agreed with the Department Exchange Co-ordinator; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Classics (Q801) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Classics (Q801).
- 23. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) (Q806). Students who are not deemed to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad by the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History will not be permitted to continue on the BA Classics (with Year Abroad) (Q806) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Classics programme (Q801).
