Assessment, progression and award

11. Modules marked ● indicate that students may choose to study up to a maximum value of 40 credits offered by other Boards of Studies over Level 2 and Level 3 together.
12. Modules marked * are not available in 2018-19.
13. Intermediate A and B language modules marked ± must be taken as A and B together in the same language and at the same level.
14. Advanced Latin modules marked † indicate that students may choose a maximum of 40 credits from this group of modules.
15. Placement study in this framework will be assessed at threshold level; the student will be assessed by the host university in the way that is normal for their own students.
16. The Board of Examiners may consider the marks reported by the host university when, at the end of the subsequent year, it is determining the degree classification of borderline cases.

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

17. Students admitted to the BA Ancient History (V110) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) programme (V113). Students taking the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) programme (V113) will undertake an approved placement in an overseas university following a course of study chosen in consultation with the Level 2 Tutor and with the host institution in which modules relating to Classics and Ancient History comprise a minimum of 50%. During the

year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) programme (V113).

18. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) programme (V113) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Ancient History programme (V110) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Classics & Ancient History to be admitted to the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) programme (V113) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure an international placement abroad/year abroad opportunity, agreed with the Department Exchange Co-ordinator; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Ancient History (V110) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History (V110).
19. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) (V113). Students who are not deemed to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad by the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History will not be permitted to continue on the BA Ancient History (with Year Abroad) (V113) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History (V110).
