## BA PHILOSOPHY (V500)

### BA PHILOSOPHY (With Year Abroad) (V500A)

1. This programme is available at Durham City, in a full-time mode of study.

#### Admissions

2. This programme is only available to students admitted to the BA Philosophy (V500) programme.
3. Candidates wishing to transfer to BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A) must:
  - a. have successfully completed BA Philosophy (V500) Level 1 and progressed to level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme;
  - b. During the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Philosophy to be admitted to the BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Philosophy;
  - c. Successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Philosophy (V500) so as to be eligible to progress to level 3 of the BA Philosophy (V500) Honours programme.

### Year 3 (Year Abroad)

- Students will undertake an approved placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. Courses relating to Philosophy should normally comprise a minimum of 50% of those taken.
- Students who the Philosophy Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Philosophy programme (V500).

### Level 3 (Degree)

- In accordance with the core regulations, candidates may take no more than 30 credits of Level 2 modules during Level 3. Appropriate credit-bearing language modules from the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study may be taken during Level 3, but only if the combined total of language modules and Level 2 modules taken does not exceed 30 credits.
- Candidates shall study and be assessed in the following module to the value of 40 credits:
