1. These programme regulations are for candidates entering prior to Academic Year 2018-19.
2. This programme is available at Durham City, in a full-time mode of study.

**Admissions**

3. Candidates wishing to transfer to BSc Psychology (Applied) (with Year Abroad) (C814) must:
  - a. have successfully completed BSc Psychology (Applied) (C817) Level 1 and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme;
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Psychology to be admitted to the BSc Psychology (Applied) (with Year Abroad) (C817) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Psychology;
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Psychology (Applied) (C817) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Psychology (Applied) (C817) Honours programme.

Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Psychology (Applied) (with Year Abroad) (C814) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BSc Psychology (Applied) (C817) programme

**Professional accreditation**

17. This programme is accredited on an ongoing basis from the 2012-13 intake as conferring eligibility for the Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership of the British Psychological Society. Students entering in and after October 2006 need to achieve a minimum of a second class honours degree to gain eligibility.
