A Dissertation must be taken alongside at least one other Level 3 module in the relevant discipline.

At Level 3 candidates must study modules from at least two disciplines.

Year 3 (Placement Year / Study Abroad)

2. Students admitted to the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (VL52) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Placement Year) programme (VLL6) or the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Study Abroad) programme (VLLA).

- 3. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Placement Year) (VLL6) or the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Study Abroad) (VLLA) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (VL52) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the PPE Programme Director in the Business School to be admitted to the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Placement Year) (VLL6) or the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Study Abroad) (VLLA) and have their application approved by the PPE Programme Director in the Business School; and
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (VL52) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (VL52) Honours programme.

Placement Year

- 4. Students will undertake an approved work placement of not less than 40 weeks. They must have successfully completed 240 credits at Levels 1 and 2 to progress to the placement. Student progress will be assessed at threshold level by continuous assessments of the student's performance during the placement and a final report. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics with Placement Year.
- 5. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Business School deem to have made satisfactory progress on the Placement Year will continue to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Placement Year) (VLL6). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the Placement Year will not be permitted to continue on BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Placement Year) (VLL6), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (VL52) programme.

Study Abroad

- 6. Students will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university. Student progress will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics with Study Abroad. Students should pass a minimum of 40 ECTS credits, or equivalent, to successfully complete the year, as set out in their Learning Agreement.
- 7. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Business School deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Study Abroad) (VLLA). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (with Study Abroad) (VLLA), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy, Politics and Economics (VL52) programme.

Access to Philosophy Modules

8. The Department of Philosophy has agreed an exemption for PPE students with respect to the requirement that students registering for any particular Philosophy module, at either Level 2 or Level 3, must register for at least one other Philosophy module at the relevant level. This exemption applies only to (a) all current students who commenced their programme of study prior to 2019/20, and (b) students who will commence their programme of study in 2019/20.
