### Assessment, progression and award

- 9. Modules marked with a \* are not running in 2020-21.
- 10. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 39% cannot be compensated.
- 11. Modules marked with a # must be at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.

#### Year Abroad

- 12. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology (L602) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) programme (L609). Students undertaking the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology with Year Abroad.
- 13. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology (L602) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology, and;
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology (L602) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (L602) Honours programme.

14. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L609) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (L602) programme.

#### **Placement Year**

- 15. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology (L602) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) programme (L612). Students taking the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L612) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks (or at least 24 weeks in 2020/21) of professional-level work experience.
  - Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L612). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Anthropology (L602) programme.
- 16. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L612) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology (L602) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L612) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
  - secure a placement opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks (or at least 24 weeks in 2020/21)of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
  - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology (L602) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (L602).
- 17. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L612). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L612) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Anthropology programme (L602).
