The dissertation (one from List B above) will involve detailed study of a particular aspect of Medieval or Early Modern history, literature, society or culture, and will preferably, though not necessarily, adopt an interdisciplinary approach. The subject and the title of the dissertation will be determined by the student and the lead supervisor. The title of the dissertation and the allocation of supervisor(s) will be approved by the Course Programme Director who will be responsible for determining the deadline for approval of the dissertation title. The supervision procedure will follow the regulations specified in the MA programme of the respective department of choice.
7. The choice of optional modules (List C above) must be approved by the Programme Director.
8. Modules marked with # are available in Michaelmas Term only.
9. Modules marked with ~ are available in Epiphany Term only.
10. Please note that not all combinations of modules will be available due to timetabling constraints.
11. ** Students may choose one topic from a list representing the main areas of research in the Department. Examples might include: The Archaeology of Burial Practice in Britain, C12th-c19th; The Archaeology of Indian Ocean Commerce in the Islamic Period; The Archaeology of Urban Life in Britain, C12th-C18th.
