Assessment, progression and award

10. Modules marked with # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the ordinary degree at the next Level.
11. Modules marked with a ¥ require students to attend three weeks on a placement specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology. For the Level 2 module Professional Training this will normally be an excavation placement during the summer preceding entry to Level 2. For the Level 3 module Advanced Professional Training / Advanced Professional Training (with Skills Passport) this will normally take place during the summer preceding entry to Level 3
12. Only 20 credits marked with a ± can be taken at Levels 2 and 3 combined.
13. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
14. Modules marked * are not available in 2021-22.

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

15. Students admitted to the BA Archaeology (F400) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Archaeology (with Year Abroad) programme (F401). Students undertaking the BA Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (F401) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Archaeology with Year Abroad.
16. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (F401) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Archaeology (F400) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Archaeology to be admitted to the BA Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (F401) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the Department of Archaeology, and;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Archaeology (F400) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology (F400) Honours programme.

17. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Archaeology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (F401). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (F401) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology (F400) programme.

Year 3 (Placement Year)

18. Students admitted to the BA Archaeology (F400) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Archaeology with Placement Year programme (F409). Students taking the BA Archaeology with Placement Year (F409) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
19. Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine where the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Archaeology Placement Year (F409). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Archaeology (F400) programme.
20. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Archaeology with Placement Year (F409) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Archaeology (F400) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Archaeology to be admitted to the BA Archaeology with Placement Year (F409) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure a placement/ year abroad opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Archaeology (F400) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology (F400).
21. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Archaeology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Archaeology with Placement Year (F409). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Archaeology with Placement Year (F409), but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Archaeology programme (F400).

Professional Accreditation

22. For students who wish to follow the pathway to a degree accredited by the Chartered Institute for Archaeology, they must have successfully completed all modules marked with a (A), and one of the modules marked with (A+).
