**Level 3 (Year Abroad)**

8. Students will undertake an approved placement at a foreign university, taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. Students are particularly encouraged to take literary modules that might be uniquely tied to the regional, national and/or international status of the host institution and/or to take advantage of opportunities to develop/refine foreign language skills if appropriate.
9. Students who the English Studies Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (Q3V5) programme. Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA English Literature with Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (Q3V5) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA English Literature with Philosophy (QV35) programme.

**Level 3 (Placement Year)**

10. Students admitted to the BA English Literature and Philosophy (QV35) are able to apply to transfer to the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement Year) programme (Q3V6). Students taking the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement Year) (Q3V6) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement Year) (Q3V6). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA English Literature and Philosophy (QV35) programme.

11. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement Year) (Q3V6) must:

- a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA English Literature and Philosophy (QV35) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of English to be admitted to the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement) (Q3V6) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
  - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
  - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA English Literature and Philosophy (QV35) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA English Literature and Philosophy (QV35).
12. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of English deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement Year) (Q3V6). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA English Literature and Philosophy (with Placement Year) (Q3V6) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA English Literature and Philosophy programme (QV35).

### Level 3 (Degree)

13. In accordance with the core regulations, candidates must take at least 90 credits of Level 3 modules during Level 3.

### **Assessment, progression and award**

- Candidates must select at least 80 credits, but no more than 140 credits, from modules offered by each Board of Studies over Level 2 and Level 3. This must include at least 40 credits from each Board of Studies in each Level, at least 100 credits from both Boards of Studies in each level.
- Modules marked  $\Delta$  may be taken at either level 2 or level 3, to a total value of 40 credits.
- Not all modules listed (including Special Topics) will necessarily be available in any one year.
- Modules marked \* are not available in 2021-2022
