Beyond the modules named in this list, candidates may also study and be assessed in modules offered by other Boards of Studies up to the value of 40 credits (including appropriate credit-bearing language modules offered by the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study).

Year 3 (Year abroad)

- 7. Students admitted to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) programme (V618).
- 8. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) (V618) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Theology and Religion to be admitted to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) (V618) and have their application approved by the Department's International Placements Coordinator; and
 - c. secure an international placement abroad/year abroad opportunity, agreed with the Department Exchange Co-ordinator; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617).
- 9. Students undertaking the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) (V618) will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During this year, at least half of the modules taken at the host university must be in the study of religion.
- 10. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) (V618).
- 11. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Theology and Religion deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) (V618). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Year Abroad) (V618) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) programme.

Year 3 (Placement)

- 12. Students admitted to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement) programme (V619). Students taking the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement) (V619) will undertake an approved placement in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
 - Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement) (V619). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) programme.
- Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement) (V619) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Theology to be admitted to the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement) (V619) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (V617).
- 14. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Theology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement Year) (V619). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Religion, Society and Culture (with Placement Year) (V619) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Religion, Society and Culture programme (V617).

Level 3 (Degree)

- 15. In accordance with the core regulations, candidates may take no more than 30 credits of Level 2 modules during Level 3. Appropriate credit-bearing language modules from the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study may be taken during Level 3, but only if the combined total of language modules and Level 2 modules taken does not exceed 30 credits.
- 16. Candidates shall study and be assessed in the following module to the value of 40 credits:
