Assessment, progression and award

Year Abroad

- 18. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Year Abroad) programme (LL63). Students undertaking the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Year Abroad) (LL63) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology and Sociology with Year Abroad.
- 19. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Year Abroad) (LL63) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the School of Applied Social Sciences to be admitted to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Year Abroad) (LL63) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the School of Applied Social Sciences, and;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) Honours programme.
- 20. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Sociology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Year Abroad) (LL63). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Year Abroad) (LL63) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) programme.

Placement Year

- 21. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Placement Year) programme (L6L3). Students taking the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Placement Year) (L6L3) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
- 22. Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Placement Year) (L6L3). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) programme.
- 23. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Placement Year) (L6L3) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Sociology to be admitted to the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Placement) (L6L3) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (LL36).

24. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Sociology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Sociology (with Placement Year) (L6L3). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology and Sociology (Placement Year) (L6L3) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Anthropology and Sociology programme (LL36).
