Assessment, progression and award

10. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
11. Modules marked ** can only be taken to a total of 40 credits across two or more separate years of the programme.
12. Module marked # SGIA 2341 Research Project must be taken at Level 2 in order to undertake SGIA 3142 Dissertation at Level 3.
13. Modules marked * are not available in 2023-24.
14. Elective modules are subject to availability and timetabling.

Year Abroad

15. Students admitted to the BA Politics & International Relations (L255) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Politics & International Relations (with Year Abroad) programme (L255). Students undertaking the BA Politics & International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L255) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Politics & International Relations with Year Abroad.
16. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Politics & International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L255) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Politics & International Relations (L253) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs to be admitted to the BA Politics & International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L255) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs, and;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Politics & International Relations (L253) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Politics & International Relations (L253) Honours programme.
 - d. meet any specific academic requirements necessary for transfer to the partner institution.
17. Students who the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Politics & International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L255). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Politics & International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L255) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Politics & International Relations (L253) programme.

Placement Year

18. Students admitted to the BA Politics & International Relations programme (L253) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) programme (L254). Students taking the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) (L254) will undertake an approved placement in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) (L254). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Politics & International Relations programme (L253).

19. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) (L254) must:

- a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Politics & International Relations programme (L253) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs to be admitted to the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) (L254) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Politics & International Relations programme (L253) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Politics & International Relations (L253).
 - e. to have a minimum record of 80% attendance at both Level 1 and Level 2, unless there are any serious adverse circumstances that explain lower attendance. Students who fail to meet these criteria will continue to Level 3 of the BA Politics & International Relations programme (L253).
20. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) (L254). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Politics & International Relations (with Placement Year) (L254) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Politics & International Relations programme (L253).
