**Assessment, progression and award**

10. Modules marked with a \* are not running in 2023-24.
11. Modules marked with a # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of the Ordinary Degree.
12. Not more than one dissertation may be submitted.
13. Only one module offered by the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study marked  $\Theta$  may be taken at Level 1 and only one such module over Levels 2 and 3 combined. Note that if Doing Anthropological Research ANTH 1101 is taken at Level 2, a Level 1 20 credit module offered by the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study cannot also be taken at Level 2.
14. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree.
15. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
16. Modules marked with a  $\yen$  require students to attend three weeks on a placement specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology. For the Level 2 module Professional Training this will normally be an excavation placement during the summer preceding entry to Level 2. For the Level 3 module Advanced Professional Training this will normally take place during the summer preceding entry to Level 3.
17. Modules marked with  $\neq$  cannot be chosen if the same module has already been chosen under List C.

18. Modules marked with a £: fieldwork modules can be taken in both Anthropology and Archaeology but University funding will only be available for fieldwork in **one** of the Departments.
19. Modules marked with a ^ must be taken together.

### **Year Abroad**

20. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) programme (LF01). Students undertaking the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (LF01) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology and Archaeology with Year Abroad.
21. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (LF01) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours or Ordinary programme, and;
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology (the lead Department for the programme) to be admitted to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (LF01) and have their application approved by the Chairs of the Boards of Studies in the Department of Anthropology and the Department of Archaeology, and;
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) Honours programme.
22. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (LF01). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (LF01) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) programme.

### **Placement Year**

23. Students admitted to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) programme (LF02). Students taking the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) (LF02) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) (LF02). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) programme.
24. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) (LF02) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours or Ordinary programme; and
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) (LF02) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
  - c. secure a placement opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
  - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (LF64).

25. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) (LF02). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Anthropology and Archaeology (with Placement Year) (LF02) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Anthropology and Archaeology programme (LF64).
