Assessment, progression and award

13. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.
14. Modules marked § are taught in Michaelmas Term 2023 only.
15. Modules marked % are taught in Epiphany Term 2024 only.
16. Modules marked £ must be taken together.
17. Only one language module offered by the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study marked Θ may be taken at each level.
18. Modules marked with a ¥ require students to attend three weeks on a placement specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology. For the Level 2 module Professional Training this will normally be an excavation placement during the summer preceding entry to Level 2. For the Level 3 module Advanced Professional Training this will normally take place during the summer preceding entry to Level 3
19. Modules marked with ¥¥ require students to go on a fieldtrip at the end of Level 2, preceding entry to Level 3.
20. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.

21. The Boards of Examiners may consider the marks reported by the host university when, at the end of the subsequent year, it is determining the degree classification of borderline cases.

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

22. Students admitted to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) programme (QV15). Students undertaking the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) programme (QV15) will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the Level 2 Tutor in the Department of Classics & Ancient History and the programme director in the Department of Archaeology and with the host institution and in which modules relating to Ancient History or Archaeology comprise a minimum of 50%. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad).
23. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (QV15) must:
- have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours programme, and;
 - during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Archaeology to be admitted to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (QV15) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Archaeology; and
 - successfully complete Level 2 of BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) Honours programme.
24. Students who the Board of Examiners for Archaeology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (QV15). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will not be permitted to continue on the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (with Year Abroad) (QV15), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) programme.

Year 3 (Placement Year)

25. Students admitted to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Archaeology with Placement Year programme (QV16). Students taking the BA Ancient History and Archaeology with Placement Year (QV16) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
26. Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine where the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Ancient History and Archaeology Placement Year (QV16). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) programme.
27. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology with Placement Year (QV16) must:
- have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
 - during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Archaeology to be admitted to the BA Ancient History and Archaeology with Placement Year (QV16) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and

- c. secure a placement/ year abroad opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology (VF14).
28. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Archaeology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology with Placement Year (QV16). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Ancient History and Archaeology with Placement Year (QV16), but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Ancient History and Archaeology programme (VF14).
