BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807); BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Year Abroad (C808); BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Placement (C809) [First intake in 2022]

- 1. This programme is available at Durham City, in a full-time mode of study.
- 2. The BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science With Year Abroad (C808) and BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Placement (C809) programmes are only available to students admitted to the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) programme

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

- 6. Students will undertake an approved placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution.
- 7. Students whom the Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Year Abroad (C808) programme. Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Year Abroad (C808) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) programme.

Year 3 (Placement)

8. Students will undertake an approved placement taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution.

9. Students whom the Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the placement, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Placement (C809) programme. Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Placement (C809) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C809) programme.

Assessment, progression and award

- 13. Modules marked with the # symbol must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.
- 14. Modules marked with the ~ symbol must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30-39% cannot be compensated.
- 15. Modules marked with the * symbol are not available in 2024-25.
- 16. Not all the modules in List B will necessarily be available in any one year.
- 17. The following combination of module pairs are not allowed:
 - a. PSYC3601 The Principles of Learning and PSYC3637 Close Relationships;
 - b. PSYC3587 Psychology and Health Promotion and PSYC3401 Emotion and Social Perception;
 - c. PSYC3727 Eating Disorders and PSYC3697 Statistical Modelling;
 - d. PSYC3427 Face Recognition and PSYC3411 Clinical Neuropsychology;

- e. PSYC3367 Fallacies and Biases: Social Cognitive Perspectives and PSYC3337 The Multisensory Body;
- f. PSYC3577 Psychological Practice and PSYC3401 Emotion and Social Perception;
- g. PSYC3767 Psychology of Equality, Diversity and Inclusivity (EDI) and PSYC3601 The Principles of Learning;
- h. PSYC 3657 Environmental Psychology and Sustainability and PSYC 3411 Clinical Neuropsychology.

Year Abroad

- 18. The BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Year Abroad (C808) programme is only available to students admitted to the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) programme.
- 19. Candidates wishing to transfer to BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Year Abroad (C808) must:
 - a. have successfully completed BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) Level 1 and progressed to Level 2 of the programme;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Psychology to be admitted to the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Year Abroad (C808) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Psychology;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) programme so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) programme.

Placement

- 20. Candidates wishing to transfer to BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Placement (C809) must:
 - a. have successfully completed BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) Level 1 and progressed to Level 2 of the programme;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Psychology to be admitted to the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science with Placement (C809) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Psychology;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Psychological and Behavioural Science (C807) programme.

Professional accreditation

- 21. This programme is accredited on an ongoing basis as conferring eligibility for the Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership of the British Psychological Society.
- 22. The empirical project (PSYC3452 Behavioural Science Dissertation) must be passed in order to achieve Graduate Basis for Chartered membership.
- 23. A minimum of a second class honours degree is required to gain eligibility for Graduate Basis for Chartered membership
