Assessment, progression and award

- 9. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.
- 10. Modules marked ** can only be taken to a total of 40 credits across two or more separate years of the programme.
- 11. Module marked # SGIA 2341 Research Project must be taken at Level 2 and must be successfully completed in order to undertake SGIA 3142 Dissertation at Level 3.
- 12. Modules marked * are not available in 2024-25.
- 13. Elective modules are subject to availability and timetabling.

Year Abroad

- 14. Students admitted to the BA Politics (L200) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Politics (with Year Abroad) programme (L202). Students undertaking the BA Politics (with Year Abroad) (L202) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Politics with Year Abroad.
- 15. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Politics (with Year Abroad) (L202) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Politics (L200) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs to be admitted to the BA Politics (with Year Abroad) (L202) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs, and;
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Politics (L200) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Politics (L200) Honours programme;
 - d. meet any specific academic requirements necessary for transfer to the partner institution.
- 16. Students who the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Politics (with Year Abroad) (L202). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Politics (with Year Abroad) (L202) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Politics (L200) programme.

Placement Year

17. Students admitted to the BA Politics programme (L200) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Politics (with Placement Year) programme (L203). Students taking the BA Politics (with Placement Year) (L203) will undertake an approved placement in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

During the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete the placement assessments outlined in the Faculty Placement Year Module CSSS 3986, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Politics (with Placement Year) (L203). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Politics programme (L250).

18. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Politics (with Placement Year) (L203) must:

- a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Politics programme (L200) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
- secure a placement / year abroad opportunity comprising at least 40 weeks of professionallevel work experience, approved by the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Manager; and
- c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Politics programme (L200) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Politics (L200).
- d. have a minimum record of 80% attendance at both Level 1 and Level 2, unless there are any serious adverse circumstances that explain lower attendance and have successfully completed 240 credits at Level 1 and 2. Students who fail to meet these criteria will continue to Level 3 of the BA Politics programme (L200).
- 19. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the three required on-placement assessments will continue to Level 3 of the BA Politics (with Placement Year) (L203). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Politics (with Placement Year) (L203) programme but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Politics programme (L200).
