### Assessment, progression and award

8. Modules marked with a \* are not running in 2024-25.
9. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.

10. Modules marked with a # must be at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.

### **Year Abroad**

11. Students admitted to the BSc Anthropology (L601) are able to apply to transfer to the BSc Anthropology (with Year Abroad) programme (L610). Students undertaking the BSc Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L610) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BSc Anthropology with Year Abroad.
12. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BSc Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L610) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BSc Anthropology (L601) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours programme, and;
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BSc Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L610) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology, and;
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Anthropology (L601) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Anthropology (L601) Honours programme.
13. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L610). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Anthropology (with Year Abroad) (L610) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BSc Anthropology (L601) programme.

### **Placement Year**

14. Students admitted to the BSc Anthropology (L601) are able to apply to transfer to the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) programme (L611). Students taking the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L611) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L611). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BSc Anthropology (L601) programme.
15. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L611) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BSc Anthropology (L601) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L611) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
  - c. secure a placement opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
  - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Anthropology (L601) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Anthropology (L601).
16. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L611). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Anthropology (with Placement Year) (L611) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BSc Anthropology programme (L601).
