### Assessment, progression and award

11. Modules marked ● indicate that students may choose a maximum of 40 credits from other Boards of Studies across Level 2 and Level 3 combined.
12. Intermediate A and B language modules marked ± must be taken as A and B together in the same language and at the same level.
13. Modules marked \$ are taught in Michaelmas Term 2024 only.
14. Modules marked % are taught in Epiphany Term 2025 only.
15. With reference to the Core Regulations for Undergraduate Programmes pt 13 *“Where undergraduate modules are delivered entirely in a single term, students undertaking such modules should be permitted to take no more than 70 credits in total in a single term.”*
16. Placement study in this framework will be assessed at threshold level; the student will be assessed by the host university in the way that is normal for their own students.
17. The Board of Examiners may consider the marks reported by the host university when, at the end of the subsequent year, it is determining the degree classification of borderline cases.
18. Placements will be assessed through a pass/fail module.

### Year 3 (Year Abroad)

19. Students admitted to the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) programme (Q821). Students undertaking the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) (Q821) will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with their Level 2 Tutor in the Department of Classics & Ancient History and with the host institution in which modules relating to Classics and Ancient History comprise a minimum of 50%. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) (Q821).
20. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) (Q821) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Classics & Ancient History to be admitted to the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) (Q821) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
  - c. secure an international placement abroad/year abroad opportunity, agreed with the Department Exchange Co-ordinator; and
  - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820).

21. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) (Q821). Students who are not deemed to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad by the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History will not be permitted to continue on the BA Classical Civilisation (with Year Abroad) (Q821) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820).

### **Year 3 (Placement Year)**

22. Students admitted to the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Classical Civilisation (with Placement Year) programme (Q822). Students taking the BA Classical Civilisation (with Placement Year) (Q822) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Classical Civilisation (with Placement Year) (Q822). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) programme.

23. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Classical civilisation (with Placement Year) (Q822) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Classics & Ancient History to be admitted to the BA Classical Civilisation (with Placement) (Q822) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
  - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
  - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Classical Civilisation (Q820).
24. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Classics & Ancient History deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Classical Civilisation (with Placement Year) (Q822). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Classical Civilisation (with Placement Year) (Q822) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Classical Civilisation programme (Q820).
