### Assessment, progression and award

9. Modules marked # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next Level of study.
10. At Levels 2 and 3, a module in History must have been passed in the previous year at 40% or above in order to progress to modules in History at the next level.
11. Modules marked ¥ require students to attend three weeks on a placement specified by the Board of Studies in Archaeology. For the Level 2 module Professional Training this will normally be an excavation placement during the summer preceding entry to Level 2. For the Level 3 module Advanced Professional Training / Advanced Professional Training (with Skills Passport) this will normally take place during the summer preceding entry to Level 3.
12. Only 20 credits marked with ± can be taken at Levels 2 and 3 combined.
13. Modules marked ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.

### Year 3 (Year Abroad)

14. Students admitted to the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) programme are able to apply to transfer to the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad programme (F412). Students undertaking the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad programme (F412) will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad.

15. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad (F412) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Historical Archaeology and progressed to Level 2 of the programme, and;
  - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Archaeology to be admitted to the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad (F412) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Archaeology; and
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) programme.
16. Students who the Board of Examiners for Archaeology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad (F412). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Historical Archaeology with Year Abroad (F412), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) programme.

### **Year 3 (Placement Year)**

17. Students admitted to the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Historical Archaeology with Placement Year programme (F413). Students taking the BA Historical Archaeology with Placement Year (F413) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
18. During the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete the placement assessments as outlined in the Faculty Placement Year Module [FSOC3099](#), to determine where the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Historical Archaeology with Placement Year (F413). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) programme.
19. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Historical Archaeology with Placement Year (F413) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) and progressed to Level 2 of the programme; and
  - b. secure a Placement Year opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, approved by the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and Faculty Placement Manager; and
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411).
20. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Archaeology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the three on-placement assessments will continue to Level 3 of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Historical Archaeology with Placement Year (F413), but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Historical Archaeology (F411) programme.

### **Professional Accreditation**

21. For students who wish to follow the pathway to a degree accredited by the Chartered Institute for Archaeology, they must have successfully completed all modules marked with an (A), and one of the modules marked with (A+).
