Assessment, progression and award

8. Note: modules with fewer than 20 students enrolled may not run.
9. Modules marked with a < will be delivered in Term 1, while modules marked with a > will be delivered in Term 2.
10. Modules marked with a # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.
11. Modules marked with a ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 – 39% cannot be compensated.

Professional accreditation

13. Durham University Business School is accredited by the European Quality Improvement System (EQUIS) for a period of five years from 2022 and by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) for a period of five years from 2024.

Year 3 (Placement Year / Study Abroad)

14. Students admitted to the BSc Economics (L130) are able to apply to transfer to the BSc Economics (with Placement Year) programme (L131) or the BSc Economics (with Study Abroad) programme (L132).
15. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BSc Economics (with Placement Year) (L131) or the BSc Economics (with Study Abroad) (L132) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BSc Economics (L130) and progressed to Level 2 of the honours programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the BSc Economics' Programme Director to be admitted to the BSc Economics (with Placement Year) (L131) or the BSc Economics (with Study Abroad) (L132) and have their application approved by the BSc Economics' Programme Director; and
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Economics (L130) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Economics (L130) Honours programme.

Placement Year

16. Students will undertake an approved work placement of not less than 40 weeks. They must have successfully completed 240 credits at Levels 1 and 2 to progress to the placement. Student progress will be assessed at threshold level by continuous assessments of the student's performance during the placement and a final report. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BSc Economics with Placement Year.

17. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Business School deem to have made satisfactory progress on the Placement Year will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Economics (with Placement Year) (L131). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on BSc Economics (with Placement Year) (L131), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BSc Economics (L130) programme.

Study Abroad

18. Students will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university. Student progress will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BSc Economics with Study Abroad. Students should pass a minimum of 40 ECTS credits, or equivalent, to successfully complete the year, as set out in their Learning Agreement.
19. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Business School deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Economics (with Study Abroad) (L132). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on BSc Economics (with Study Abroad) (L132), but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BSc Economics (L130) programme.
