#### Assessment, progression and award

- 9. Modules marked with ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30 39% cannot be compensated.
- 10. Modules marked \*\* can only be taken to a total of 40 credits across two or more separate years of the programme.
- 11. Modules marked with # must be passed at 40% or above in order to proceed to the next level of study.
- 12. Modules marked \* are not available in 2025-26.
- 13. Optional modules are subject to timetable compatibility. Not all optional modules will run every year.

### Year Abroad

- 14. Students admitted to the BA International Relations (L250) are able to apply to transfer to the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) programme (L251). Students undertaking the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA International Relations with Year Abroad.
- 15. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA International Relations (L250) and progressed to Level 2 of the programme, and;
  - during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs to be admitted to the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the School of Government and International Affairs, and;
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA International Relations (L250) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (L250) programme; and
  - d. meet any specific academic requirements necessary for transfer to the partner institution.
- 16. Students who the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA International Relations (with Year Abroad) (L251) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (L250) programme.

#### **Placement Year**

- 17. Students admitted to the BA International Relations (L250) are able to apply to transfer to the BA International Relations (with Placement Year) programme (L252). Students taking the BA International Relations (with Placement Year) (L252) will undertake an approved placement in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
- 18. During the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete the placement assessments outlined in the Faculty Placement Year module (FSOC3099), to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA International Relations (with Placement Year) (L252). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA International Relations (L250) programme.
- 19. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA International Relations (with Placement Year) (L252) must:
  - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA International Relations (L250) and progressed to Level 2 of the programme; and
  - b. secure a Placement Year opportunity comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, approved by the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Manager; and
  - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA International Relations (L250) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (L250); and

- d. have a minimum record of 80% attendance at both Level 1 and Level 2, unless there are any serious adverse circumstances that explain lower attendance and have successfully completed 240 credits at Level 1 and 2. Students who fail to meet these criteria will continue to Level 3 of the BA International Relations programme (L250).
- 20. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the School of Government and International Affairs deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the three required on-placement assessments will continue to Level 3 of the BA International Relations (with Placement Year) (L252). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA International Relations (with Placement Year) (L252) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA International Relations programme (L250).
