Assessment, progression and award

- 11. Over Levels 2 and 3, students must choose credits to the value of at least 100, and no more than 140, from those offered by each Board of Studies.
- 12. Modules marked with ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30-39% cannot be compensated.
- 13. Modules marked with # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.
- 14. Modules marked Δ may be taken at either level 2 or level 3, to a total value of 40 credits.
- 15. At least one module marked ϕ must be chosen over Levels 2 and 3.
- 16. Exceptionally for academic year 2025/26 only, candidates may, with the written permission of the Director of Undergraduate Studies, take 20 credits of programme-specific Level 1 modules during Level 2 study (subject to timetable compatibility).
- 17. Exceptionally academic year 2025/26 only, candidates may, with the written permission of the Director of Undergraduate Studies, take 20 credits of programme-specific Level 2 modules during Level 3 study (subject to timetable compatibility).

Level 3 (Year Abroad)

- 18. Students will undertake an approved placement at a foreign university, taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. Students are particularly encouraged to take literary modules that might be uniquely tied to the regional, national and/or international status of the host institution and/or to take advantage of opportunities to develop/refine foreign language skills if appropriate.
- 19. Students who the English Studies Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA English Literature with History (with Year Abroad) programme (Q2V1). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on

the BA English Literature with History (with Year Abroad) (Q2V1) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA English Literature with History (QV21).

Level 3 (Placement Year)

20. Students admitted to the BA English Literature and History (QV21) are able to apply to transfer to the BA English Literature and History (with Placement Year) programme (Q2V2). Students taking the BA English Literature and History (with Placement Year) (Q2V2) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA English Literature and History (with Placement Year) (Q2V2). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA English Literature and History (QV21) programme.

- 21. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA English Literature and History (with Placement Year) (Q2V2) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA English Literature and History (QV21) and progressed to Level 2 of the programme; and
 - b. during their Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of English to be admitted to the BA English Literature and History (with Placement) (Q2V2) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA English Literature and History (QV21) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA English Literature and History (QV21).
- 22. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of English deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA English Literature and History (with Placement Year) (Q2V2). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA English Literature and History (with Placement Year) (Q2V2) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA English Literature and History programme (QV21).
