Assessment, progression and award

10. Modules marked with # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.

Year Abroad

11. Students admitted to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) are able to apply to transfer to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Year Abroad) programme (B992). Students undertaking the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Year Abroad) (B992) programme will undertake an approved study placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. During the year abroad students will be assessed at module level by the host University. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BSc Health and Human Sciences with Year Abroad.
12. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Year Abroad) (B992) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) and progressed to Level 2 of the programme, and;
 - b. during the first term of Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology to be admitted to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Year Abroad) (B992) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in the Department of Anthropology, and;

- c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) programme.
13. Students who the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Year Abroad) (B992). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Year Abroad) (B992) programme, but must instead proceed to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) programme.

Placement Year

14. Students admitted to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) are able to apply to transfer to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Placement Year) programme (B993). Students taking the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Placement Year) (B993) will undertake an approved placement or placements in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.
- Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Placement Year) (B993). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) programme.
15. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Placement Year) (B993) must:
- a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) and progressed to Level 2 of the programme; and
 - b. secure a placement opportunity or opportunities comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - c. successfully complete Level 2 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (B991).
16. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Anthropology deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Placement Year) (B993). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BSc Health and Human Sciences (with Placement Year) (B993) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BSc Health and Human Sciences programme (B991).
