- In place of an Exploration module in either List E (Michaelmas Term) or List F (Epiphany Term), candidates may choose to undertake an appropriate language module offered by the University's Centre for Foreign Language Study, subject to timetabling-compatibility and to approval by the Centre. If candidates choose a CFLS module in this way, this may result in them studying 50cr in one term and 70cr the other. This is because they are replacing a single-term module with one that runs throughout both Michaelmas and Epiphany.
- To ensure an appropriate credit balance, students who select one module from List B and two from List C (in paragraph 4) may **not** replace an Epiphany Exploration module with a CFLS module. Similarly, students who select one module from List B and two from List D in paragraph 4 may **not** replace a Michaelmas Exploration module with a CFLS module.

Assessment, progression and award

10. Modules marked with a # must be passed at 40% or above in order to progress to the next level of study.
11. Modules marked ~ must be passed at 40% or above for the award of an honours degree. A mark of 30-39% cannot be compensated.
12. With reference to the Core Regulations for Undergraduate Programmes pt 13 "*Where undergraduate modules are delivered entirely in a single term, students undertaking such modules should be permitted to take no more than 70 credits in total in a single term.*"

Year 3 (Year Abroad)

13. Candidates wishing to transfer to BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A) must:
 - a. have successfully completed BA Philosophy (V500) Level 1 and progressed to Level 2 of the honours programme;
 - b. During their Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in Philosophy to be admitted to the BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies in Philosophy;
 - c. Successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Philosophy (V500) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy (V500) Honours programme.
14. Students will undertake an approved placement in an overseas university taking a course of study chosen in consultation with the programme director and the host institution. Courses relating to Philosophy should normally comprise a minimum of 50% of those taken.
15. Students who the Philosophy Board of Examiners deems to have made satisfactory progress on the year abroad, judged by reference to each student's learning agreement, will continue to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500A). Students who have not made satisfactory progress on the year abroad will not be permitted to continue on the BA Philosophy (with Year Abroad) (V500 A) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Philosophy programme (V500).

Year 3 (Placement)

16. Students admitted to the BA Philosophy (V500) are able to apply to transfer to the BA Philosophy (with Placement Year) programme (V500P). Students taking the BA Philosophy (with Placement Year) (V500P) will undertake an approved placement in a UK or overseas organisation consisting of at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience.

Following the placement year, students will be required to successfully complete a placement assessment as agreed by the Department, to determine whether the programme learning outcomes have been met. Assessment does not contribute to the marks used to determine the award of the degree but successful completion is required to qualify for the BA Philosophy (with Placement Year) (V500P). If a student fails, they will transfer to the BA Philosophy (V500) programme.

17. Candidates wishing to transfer to the BA Philosophy (with Placement Year) (V500P) must:
 - a. have successfully completed Level 1 of the BA Philosophy (V500) and progressed to Level 2 of the Honours programme; and
 - b. during their Level 2 study, apply to the Board of Studies in the Department of Philosophy to be admitted to the BA Philosophy (with Placement) (V500P) and have their application approved by the Chair of the Board of Studies; and
 - c. secure a placement / year abroad opportunity comprising at least 40 weeks of professional-level work experience, agreed with the Departmental Placement Year Convenor and Faculty Placement Officer; and
 - d. successfully complete Level 2 of the BA Philosophy (V500) so as to be eligible to progress to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy (V500).
18. Students whom the Board of Examiners for the Department of Philosophy deem to have fulfilled the programme learning outcomes and who successfully pass the placement assessment will continue to Level 3 of the BA Philosophy (with Placement Year) (V500P). Students who fail will not be permitted to continue on the BA Philosophy (with Placement Year) (V500P) programme, but must instead proceed to the final year of the BA Philosophy programme (V500).
